Higher Education Mobility Statistics 2007/08 – 2018/19

July 2021

These reports provide overall statistics for higher education mobilities undertaken between 2007/08 and 2018/19 academic years. There are two separate reports, one providing statistics for the Erasmus programme from 2007/08 to 2013/14, and one providing statistics for higher education mobilities within the Erasmus+ Programme, from 2014/15. The latter provides data for only the decentralised mobility aspects of the programme, namely Key Action 103 *Mobility of Individuals within Europe*, and Key Action 107 *International Credit Mobility*.

Projects supported under KA103 and KA107 are intended to promote transnational mobility activities targeting learners and staff within higher education providers.

Centralised actions are managed at a European level by the European Education and Culture Executive Agency (EACEA) located in Brussels, Belgium. Further information about these actions is available on the EACEA website (<http://eacea.ec.europa.eu>).

This report draws on management information for the Erasmus+ Programme. Only applications with a UK applicant institution or from a British Overseas Country or Territory (OCT) are included in this report. The source for all data tables is the Erasmus+ UK National Agency unless stated otherwise.
